

Welcome to the 12th annual Hope Breakfast sponsored by the Alpha Lambda Education Foundation (ALEF) and the men of the Alpha Lambda chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.

The ALEF was established by the brothers of the Alpha Lambda chapter in the year 1999 to foster educational achievement and high scholastic standards in the lives of young, African-American, and Latino youth in Louisville Metro. We accomplish this lofty goal through the allotment of collegiate scholarships to high school seniors who plan on matriculating to colleges/universities after graduation. From our inception the foundation has given thousands of dollars in scholarships with more than \$51,000 in the last five years – including this year.

Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. was founded 118 years ago on the campus of Cornell University by seven young men who sought to support one another and ensure the scholastic success of the collective group. These men, who we refer to as the Jewels, accomplished this despite the racism and discrimination that was prevalent in the year 1906. Chapters quickly spread across the nation and we were fortunate to establish a chapter here in Louisville in the year 1911.

According to the National Center for Educational Studies, their research revealed that only 8.8% of Black males received a bachelor's degree in 2022. This is compared and contrasted with Asian males at 9.7%, Hispanic males at 12.6% and White males at 61%. Education matters!!

Education is the cornerstone which stabilizes the house of accomplishment. As a fraternity which was founded on the Aims of Manly Deeds, Scholarship, and Love of All Mankind we hope this monetary allotment will start these young men on the path to educational achievement and a lifetime of success.

Thank you for joining us at our event and I thank you for your support of the Hope Breakfast and these young men.

A Brief History of Alpha Phi Alpha

Since its founding on December 4, 1906, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. has supplied voice and vision to the struggle of African-Americans and people of color around the world.

Alpha Phi Alpha, the first intercollegiate Greek-letter fraternity established by, and for African-Americans, was founded at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York by seven college men who recognized the need for a strong bond of brotherhood among African descendants in this country. The visionary founders, known as the "Jewels" of the Fraternity, are Henry Arthur Callis, Charles Henry Chapman, Eugene Kinckle Jones, George Biddle Kelley, Nathaniel Allison Murray, Robert Harold Ogle, and Vertner Woodson Tandy.

The Fraternity initially served as a study and support group for minority students who faced racial prejudice, both educationally and socially, at Cornell. The Jewel founders and early leaders of the Fraternity succeeded in laying a firm foundation for Alpha Phi Alpha's mission of developing leaders, promoting brotherhood and academic excellence, while providing service and advocacy for our communities.

Alpha Phi Alpha chapters were established at other colleges and universities, many of them historically black institutions, soon after the founding at Cornell; the first Alumni Chapter was established in 1911. While continuing to stress academic excellence among its collegiate members, Alpha also recognized the need to help correct the educational, economic, political, and social injustices faced by African-Americans in the early 20th century. Alpha Phi Alpha has long stood at the forefront of the African-American community's fight for civil rights through leaders such as: W.E.B. DuBois, Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., Edward Brooke, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Thurgood Marshall, Andrew Young, William Gray, Paul Robeson, and many others. True to its form as the "first of firsts," Alpha Phi Alpha has been interracial since 1945.

The History of Alpha Lambda Chapter

Alpha Lambda, the first graduate chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, had its inception in Louisville, Kentucky, as an outgrowth of the University Club which met at the Western Branch Library to discuss current topics of the day.

Jewel Eugene Kinckle Jones, then engaged as a teacher in the city schools of Louisville, was instrumental in persuading the following members of the University Club to become affiliated with Alpha Phi Alpha: Messrs. J.O. Blanton, A. S. Brock, W.T. Peyton, J. H. Hubert, W. Welch, F. Johnson, C.A. Powell, J.T. Clark, W. Ballard, and D. L. Lawson. It is significant to note that these men were not members of Alpha Phi Alpha at this time.

On April 11, 1911, Brother Richard Hill, a graduate of Fisk University, came from the University of Michigan where he was studying law, and with the assistance of Jewel Jones set up the first graduate chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha.

The decision to establish a graduate chapter was met by opposition from the National Body. The opinion of the Brothers at that time was that the Fraternity was for undergraduates only. After careful consideration of the matter, however, it was concluded at the Fourth Annual Convention that this infant group would be Lambda Chapter since eight undergraduates chapters were in existence at that time.

The Fifth General Convention and First Alumni Reunion convened on December 26, 1912, hosted by Kappa Chapter, Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. The new Lambda Chapter was ably represented by delegates A. S. Brock and J. T. Clark. A recommendation was presented by Brother Brock that all graduate chapters be designated similar to the undergraduate chapters, but with Lambda as a final letter. The recommendation was adopted by a motion of Jewel Kelly, seconded by Brother Dunn. Thus the Louisville chapter became known as Alpha Lambda and the system for naming the graduate chapters was established.


Mission

The Rev. Dr. Frank Mitchell Smith, Jr. has devoted his life to collaborative connectional ministry among pastors and churches. Having been in preaching ministry for 38 years with 27 of those as a Senior Pastor. After pastoring Newburg Church of Christ for 7 years, he founded Christ's Church for our Community in 2000. Dr. Smith also serves as the Executive Vice-President at Simmons College of Kentucky. A position he has held since 2007.

Dr. Smith holds degrees from Freed-Hardman University (B.A. Theology and General Communications), Indiana Wesleyan University (M.S. Management), and a Doctorate of Divinity from Simmons College of Kentucky.

Dr. Smith rigorously served in official capacities over 12 years with Louisville's Interdenominational Ministerial Coalition (IMC) ranging from Secretary to Vice President and ultimately President from 2009 – 2014. He has recently served as President of the IMC in an interim capacity throughout 2020. He continues to serve as a board member of the IMC.

He and his wife of nearly 18 years, Theresia, have one son, Jayson.



Frank L. Stanley, Sr. Leadership Award

This award recognizes an Alpha brother who has demonstrated outstanding leadership and service which contributed to the success of not only the Fraternity, but also, to the community and his chosen profession.



Bro. Charles V. Piphus, Jr.

Frank Leslie Stanley, Sr. was born in Chicago, IL and raised in Louisville, Kentucky. He graduated from Central High School in 1925. He received his B.A. from Atlanta University in 1929 and began teaching English, first at Jackson State College, then later at Central High School from 1931-1933.

Stanley joined the staff of the Louisville Defender in 1933, becoming editor and general manager in 1936. He was also a civil rights activist; in 1950 he drafted Senate Resolution #53 which led to the integration of institutions of higher education in Kentucky. He served as general president of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. from 1955 to 1957. In 1960 he advocated for the creation of the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights.

He was married to Vivian Clark Stanley and he had two sons from a previous marriage, Frank, Jr. and Kenneth.



Lyman T. Johnson "Torchbearer" Award

This award recognizes a person in the Metro Louisville community who has demonstrated a willingness and ability to make significant contributions to the community through their time, actions, and dedication. The person selected for this award should serve as a role model for advocacy, leadership, determination, and compassion in his/her efforts to affect positive change in the lives of African Americans and Latinos in Metro Louisville.



Rev. Dr. Daniel Corrie Shull

Lyman Tefft Johnson was born in Columbia, Tennessee on June 12, 1906. He was the eighth of nine children born to Mary and Robert Johnson. In 1937, Lyman married Juanita Morrell; they were married for forty years and had two children, Yvonne, and Lyman M.

Johnson received a Bachelor's Degree in 1930 from Virginia Union University and a Master's Degree in History in 1931 from the University of Michigan. He moved to Louisville in the spring of 1933 and started teaching history at Central High School. He spent the next forty years as a public and parochial school educator. In 1948 he fought successfully in federal court for admission to the all-white University of Kentucky and was also a plaintiff in the 1972-1975 federal court case that led to further integration of Louisville and Jefferson County Public Schools.

He died in Louisville, Kentucky on October 3, 1997.


